Teams from many of the nation's top law schools competed, including teams from Columbia University, Emory University, University of Arizona, University of California-Berkeley, University of California-Davis, University of California-Los Angeles, University of Florida, University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill, University of Notre Dame, and Washington and Lee University.

Winning team members are third-year law students Ashley Englund, Steven Kahn and Alexander Purpuro. Segundo Fernandez, who practices at Oertel, Fernandez, Bryant & Atkinson, P.A. in Tallahassee, and Shi-Ling Hsu, the D'Alemberte Professor at FSU Law, coached the team to victory. FSU was one of three teams competing in the final round of competition, which was judged by the Honorable Lisa Margaret Smith, United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, the Honorable Kathie A. ## FSU Law Hosts Local Autonomy and Energy Law Symposium



Richard Briffault, the Joseph P. Chamberlain Professor of Legislation at Columbia Law School, provided the keynote.

On February 21, the College of Law's [Environmental, Energy & Land Use Law Program](#) hosted a "Local Autonomy and Energy Law Symposium," featuring speakers from across the nation. The symposium focused on the rapid energy transition in the United States and explored the decline of local autonomy, both generally and in the area of energy law. While state and local clean-energy and carbon policies, and declining renewable energy costs are driving development of solar and wind farms and associated transmission lines, the U.S. continues to be a world leader in oil and natural gas production due to drilling and hydraulic fracturing in shale formations. Thousands of new wells have been drilled, triggering the construction of new pipelines and export terminals, often in close proximity to human populations.

The speakers discussed how local governments and their residents experience the brunt of the negative impacts in the form of increased truck traffic and road damage, noise, dust and air pollution during construction, aesthetic changes and many other externalities. Despite this concentration of impacts at the local level, state governments increasingly preempt local governments' abilities to address these impacts through regulation or other tools. The symposium explored these issues and potential paths forward.

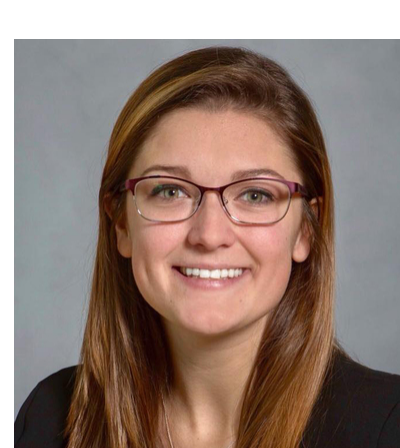

## Student Profile: 3L Jemma Takx

Jemma Takx grew up in Orlando, but she's a dual citizen of the United States and the United Kingdom. During the spring of her 2L year, she was an extern at the Southern Poverty Law Center, where she helped write policy reports and conducted interviews of potential plaintiffs for a class action suit challenging the inhumane use of solitary confinement. The summer after her 1L year, Takx was a summer associate at Watson, LLP in Orlando.

Takx is the executive article selection editor for the *Florida State University Law Review*. She will be competing in a Moot Court competition this spring and participated on the VIS Moot International Arbitration Team last year, where her team won a pre-moot held in Atlanta and competed in Vienna, Austria. During her 1L year, Takx participated on the Black Law Students Association Moot Trial Team that won second place at the regional conference and then third place at the national convention. 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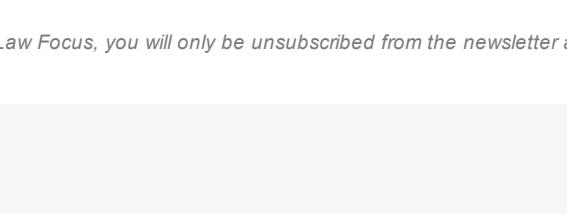
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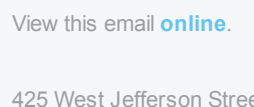
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
