Professor Nicole Stelle Garnett’s teaching and research focus on property, land use, urban development, local government law, and education policy. At Notre Dame, Professor Garnett also is a Fellow of the Institute for Educational Initiatives and the Senior Policy Advisor for the Alliance for Catholic Education. From 2008-2010, she served as Provost Fellow at Notre Dame, and, during the Spring 2007 semester, as a Visiting Professor of Law at the University of Chicago Law School. She has served as a law clerk for the Honorable Morris S. Arnold of the United States Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit and for Associate Justice Clarence Thomas of the United States Supreme Court. Before joining the law school in 1999, Professor Garnett worked for two years as a staff attorney at the Institute for Justice, a non-profit public-interest law firm in Washington, D.C. Professor Garnett received her B.A. from Stanford and her J.D. from Yale Law School.
