

assist with representation in regulatory matters before the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, Florida Public Service Commission and other agencies. She also worked on power plant siting, pipeline siting, endangered

species issues, water and air regulations, and other environmental legal issues. In the spring semester of her 2L year, Yamatova worked as a student advocate for the College of Law's Immigration and Farmworker Project. There, she prepared petitions, motions and other legal documents related to adjustments of status, T visas, asylum and refugee visas, U visas, the Violence Against Women Act and family petitions. She also prepared clinic intake forms, conducted client interviews, drafted affidavits, and researched statutes, executive orders and agency rules. In February of 2020, she, alongside her partner, presented a case in front of an immigration judge for a master calendar hearing in Orlando. The summer after her 1L year, Yamatova clerked in the Office of the General Counsel for the Florida Department of Business and Professional Regulation. In this role, she conducted legal research and case reviews and drafted memos, closing orders, final orders, administrative complaints, settlement agreements, petitions and other forms necessary for the regulation of unlicensed activity in Florida. She also worked on preparing cases that would be heard at the Florida Division of Administrative Hearings and presented cases at informal hearings.

During her time at FSU Law, Yamatova was a member of Phi Alpha Delta, the Tax Law Society, the Student Bar Association, the Entertainment and Sports Law Society and Trafficking in America Task Force.
