LAW SCHOOL



With the state's highest bar exam passage rate, an outstanding 99 percent placement rate and a dynamic faculty of experts recognized nationally for their scholarship, the Florida State University College of Law is ranked in the top tier of American law schools in terms of academic reputation by *U.S. News & World Report*. This has occurred despite a space deficit that has plagued the law school for quite some time. Since Florida State Law facilities were last expanded in 1986, the size of the student body has increased by more than 40 percent.

Thanks in great part to the hard work and persistence of many dedicated alums, University and law school administrators and Florida lawmakers, Florida State Law is poised to acquire the 50,000 square-foot First District Court of Appeal (1st DCA) building, which is directly across the street

from the law school's existing facilities. Although the journey has been long and is still not complete, law school administrators could not be more pleased to report this exciting news.

With current facilities being utilized at full capacity, the law school started planning for an expansion in 2002. Using its own funds, Florida State Law commissioned an architectural planning study to determine new space requirements necessary to accommodate its expanding student body and enhanced academic programs. The resulting conceptual plan called for a new

46,000 square-foot wing on the north side of the law school. When the project was approved by the University and its Board of Trustees in 2002, it was placed on a list of projects approved for Challenge Grant funding.

For approximately four years, the expansion project remained on the University's to-do list. Then, an exciting alternative opportunity for expansion materialized when officials at the 1st DCA realized they had outgrown their downtown Tallahassee courthouse and began the process of seeking funding for additional space.

Florida State Law is poised to acquire the 50,000 square-foot First District Court of Appeal (1st DCA) building, which is directly across the street from the law school's existing facilities.

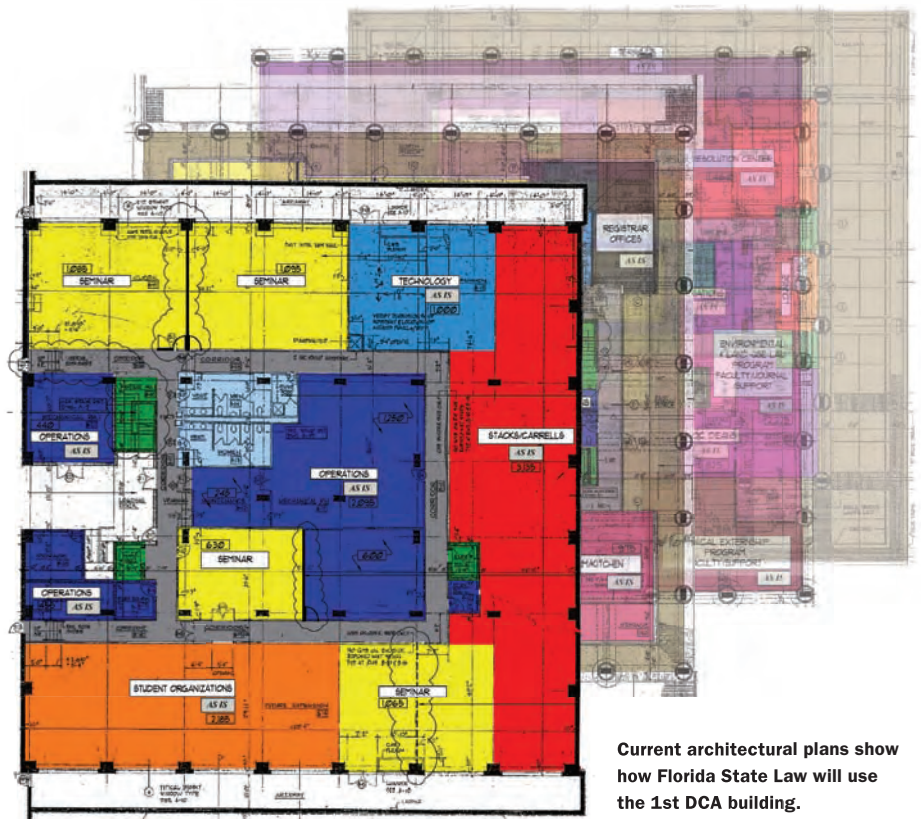
“The planning stage has been around for at least half a decade, but the funds needed for capital improvement make it hard to keep up with space needs,” said alumnus Pete Dunbar, a shareholder with Pennington, Moore, Wilkinson, Bell & Dunbar P.A. “This presented a wonderful opportunity to make that space available, and to do so at a fraction of the cost.”

As part of the process of evaluating the 1st DCA’s request for additional space, the Florida Department of Management Services (DMS) conducted an extensive study during the summer and fall of 2006 at the request of Governor Jeb Bush. Numerous possible alternatives and sites for new space for the 1st DCA were considered, as was the most cost-effective use of the courthouse building should it be vacated. A wide range of stakeholders was involved in meetings over a period of many months, including representatives of Florida State University, the Office of the Attorney General of Florida, the Office of the Public Defender, the Florida Department of State and the Office of the State Courts Administrator. Tom Lewis (’08), Secretary of DMS at the time, was personally involved in the project and presided over the meetings with all possible stakeholders.

As a stakeholder deeply interested in the outcome of the DMS study, Florida State Law seized the opportunity to prove to the state that the law school should acquire the 1st DCA building if it became available.

“Part of the reason we were so successful is that we already had architectural plans and cost estimates for a building expansion and we knew what our space needs were,” said Assistant Dean Stephanie Williams. “We also developed and provided DMS with architectural plans to show how we would use the 1st DCA space. That enabled us to prepare a proposal showing substantial cost savings to the state and to Florida taxpayers.”

Also instrumental in the law school’s efforts to convince state officials that it

should acquire the building was a group of graduates who served as advisors to administrators, counseling them throughout the DMS and legislative processes. The acquisition would not have been possible without the experience and expertise of graduates Phil Blank (’75), Pete Dunbar (’72), Steve Metz (’75), former Speaker of the Florida House of Representatives James Harold Thompson (’69), and former Speaker of the Florida House of Representatives John Thrasher (’73).

College of Law alumnus Judge Paul M. Hawkes (’86), a former state legislator, also played a critical role in helping shape this outcome. Because of their legislative experience, Judge Hawkes and his 1st DCA colleague Judge Bradford L. Thomas, an FSU undergraduate degree holder, were very effective in talking to legislators about the space needs of the 1st DCA and the

law school.

“Judge Hawkes and Judge Thomas had a vision and they were masterful and very effective in making it happen,” said Metz, a shareholder at Metz, Husband & Daughton, P.A. “The respect given to them by the Legislature because of their legislative backgrounds gave them a lot of credibility.”

“The Florida State College of Law should be very proud of the maturity level it has reached,” said Metz of the alumni who helped throughout the process. “The law school has a number of graduates who are influential political leaders throughout the state. Dean Weidner’s incessant, positive energy and vision also made the acquisition possible. He just kept at it throughout the entire process.”

On December 4, 2006, after months of meetings and study, the DMS recom-

mended that the 1st DCA move into a new 95,000 square-foot courthouse in Tallahassee's Southwood area and that the law school expand into the existing 50,000 square-foot courthouse. The DMS study noted the more than 40 percent increase in the size of the law school's student body since facilities were last expanded in 1986 and the undeniable fact that, compared to constructing the approved \$24 million new wing, the University would spend substantially less – only \$4.7 million and less than \$100 per square foot – to reconfigure the 1st DCA building. Moving to the vacated courthouse will give the law school virtually all the space it would have added by building a new \$24 million facility.

"We were very supportive of the DMS study. It became very clear during the process that renovating the 1st DCA space [for their continued use] would be very costly and bad for taxpayers," said Florida State University President T.K. Wetherell, whose tremendous knowledge of the legislative process and championing of the law school were keys to the 1st DCA building acquisition. "When the issue was placed before the

Legislature, we talked to the court, to the Governor's Office and to members of the Legislature. Don [Weidner] did a great job as did some outstanding alumni; and the legal community in general supported us because [the law school's acquisition of the 1st DCA building] was the right decision."

Substantial savings to the state, in addition to the law school's rapidly rising *U.S. News & World Report* reputational rankings, convinced legislators that Florida State had an excellent case for acquiring the 1st DCA courthouse.

"The reputation of the law school and the sense that it is on the rise resonated with the leadership of the Legislature," Metz said. "It also helped that many people making the decision frequently travel by the law school and the 1st DCA and can physically see how much logical sense it makes."

During its 2007 Legislative Session, the Florida Legislature appropriated money to construct a new courthouse in Southwood for the 1st DCA and also appropriated funds for Florida State Law to plan its move into the building being vacated by

the 1st DCA.

"[The acquisition] shows what a group can do when they work together, what can be accomplished when you have a leader who is seen as a person with good intentions and an intellectually honest approach to solving a problem – Don Weidner," said Blank, founding shareholder with the firm of Blank & Meenan, P.A. "Our message concentrated on not only why this was good for the law school, but also why it made sense for the Legislature to move the court, and allow the law school to acquire the property. The fact that the comparative cost of this project was so low in light of other alternatives showed the Legislature and staff that we care about how tax dollars are spent."

Prior to this outstanding victory, several legislative leaders and other government officials helped educate the Florida Legislature about the benefits associated with the law school's acquisition of the 1st DCA building. Instrumental in this education process were Representative Marti Coley, Senator Victor Crist, Senator Steven Geller ('82), Senator Jim King, Representative Joe Pickens, Representative Ray Sansom and Senator Alex Villalobos ('88). And with so many appropriations measures vying for the Governor's approval, the law school was fortunate to have Lieutenant Governor Jeff Kottkamp encouraging legislators to sup-

port the acquisition.

Everyone at the law school is very appreciative of the efforts of state policy-makers and their recognition of Florida State Law's space needs. All alumni who know or live in the districts of the legislators who helped throughout this process are encouraged to express their thanks.

Once the acquisition is complete, Florida State will have one of the nation's finest law school facilities for advocacy training. In addition to providing students with an excellent place to practice and prepare for advocacy events, the courthouse will be a premier venue for hosting national moot court and mock trial competitions.

"The expansion will do wonders for the law school and our moot court and mock trial programs," said Wetherell. "The DCA building will be a great addition to not only the law school, but also to Tallahassee and the community. It will be great for the Legislature as well and will provide some continuing education opportunities."

"What you are going to see with the 1st DCA, the law school, the Center for Professional Development, and the civic center is a cooperative venture for the law school and the Tallahassee community in general," Wetherell said when asked about how the building acquisition will affect Florida State's future plans. "The whole area will become an FSU complex with opportunities

for the university to expand."

While the law school is eager to take up residence in the 1st DCA courthouse, it will be 2009 at the earliest before it fully acquires the building. In the meantime, the renovation of the 1st DCA building has been included in Florida State's Master Plan and law school faculty and administrators continue to plan for the acquisition.

As a result of years of careful planning and aggressive lobbying, the law school is closer than ever to completing the largest facilities expansion in its history. And because only nominal renovations to the building will be necessary after it is vacated by the 1st DCA, Florida State Law students and staff will be able to start using the building very quickly.

To fulfill the goal of having one of the nation's premier venues for advocacy training and competitions, current plans include using the 1st DCA's existing courtroom and adding four smaller courtrooms. Administrative offices, seminar rooms, library and study space, a student organization area and a proposed Law, Business and Economics Center are also components of the law school's current plans for the 1st DCA building. These changes will allow for some very beneficial renovations to the law school's current space, including the conversion of the current courtroom into a much needed 100-student classroom.

"Our law school is in great shape. The dean and the faculty are doing a great job," said Thompson, a shareholder at Ausley & McMullen, P.A. "Being in the state capital is a great asset and this kind of activity just proves that. This was just another way to take advantage of [being in Tallahassee]. Dean Weidner did a great job – he did it all and he deserves the credit."

Even though there is still work to do and budget hurdles to clear before the moving trucks cross Martin Luther King, Jr. Boulevard to the courthouse, law school administrators are thrilled to have entered the next stage of planning for the expansion. With the continued support of advocates like President Wetherell, top state legislators and the many influential alumni who have been valuable allies throughout the process, there will be much more news concerning acquisition plans as they develop.

"This accomplishment is a great example of the natural partnerships that there are with the College of Law, the university, the Legislature and the leadership of the state," said Metz. "Because we're housed [in Tallahassee], it makes great sense that we have those partnerships. We should use this as a model to build on those partnerships in the future." ■

A Blockbuster Balancing Act



Balancing the many demands of a corporate law career at a Fortune 500 company would be difficult enough for most people, but one Florida State College of Law graduate manages to juggle her career with motherhood, caring for three young children all under the age of five. What is the secret to making it all work for this honors graduate?

As an in-house attorney for Blockbuster Inc., Mitzi Brown has worked on a variety of legal issues since graduating from law school in 1997. From the general operation and marketing duties she handled in her early days as a staff attorney to negotiating contracts with major motion picture studios, Brown has learned the business of Blockbuster in depth. And as the primary attorney for Blockbuster subsidiary DEJ Productions Inc. (which Blockbuster sold in 2005), she played a significant role in negotiations for the acquisition and home video distribution of more than 200 motion pictures, including recent award winners “Monster”

and “Crash.”

Brown says studio work “that involves primarily the acquisition of physical products” takes up the majority of her time in her newest role as managing counsel. She negotiates, structures and drafts agreements with the major film studios and numerous other vendors and distributors of the thousands of movies, snacks and video games in local Blockbuster stores.

A recent negotiating highlight of her decade-long career at Blockbuster came last fall when she served as the company’s attorney on a deal that gave Blockbuster exclusive rental rights for The Weinstein Company’s theatrical and direct-to-video titles. When announcing the agreement with the multi-media enterprise in New York City, Brown had the opportunity to meet Miramax Films co-founders and The Weinstein Company owners Harvey and Bob Weinstein.

“That was a good moment for me because they seemed to be impressed with my performance, and that’s a lot coming from the party that you are negotiating with,” Brown recalled.

Being an attorney for a leading global provider of in-home movie and game entertainment comes with benefits Brown could not have received in private practice, and working with and observing so many business executives right out of law school has taught her much about corporate law.

“One of the benefits of working in house is that you are able to and must learn the business of the company,” explained Brown. “I have a stake in this company and how well this company does. I feel like every day I can come in and I can contribute to that.”

While it would be understandable if a company with more than 7,800 stores worldwide had a team of hundreds of in-house attorneys, Blockbuster’s Dallas legal department actually consists of about 10 lawyers. The team is responsible for all of Blockbuster’s North American stores and operations. Having the assistance of outside law firms around the country that help with local litigation and labor and employment cases makes their jobs more manageable.

Although Blockbuster attorneys log long hours, Brown’s job is not without perks. Two of these perks are attending exclusive

movie screenings with her family and meeting famous actors through Blockbuster’s Spotlights Program, including Edward Norton and the Wilson brothers (Andrew, Luke and Owen). Brown also attended The Blockbuster Entertainment Awards when the show was still being aired.

As the mother of four-year-old twin boys, Caleb and Mason, and two-year-old Jacob, Brown’s home life does not provide the conventional respite from her hectic days at the office. Fortunately for Brown and her husband of 12 years, Roy, who is a mechanical engineer, they have worked to find a balance between their careers and taking care of the boys.

“My husband has been my partner in all of this and he’s been my cheerleader and

that’s good to have,” said Brown of the man she met in class as an undergraduate student at Florida State in January 1993.

Brown and her husband were married in August 1995 during the summer between her first and second years of law school. She received a job offer from Blockbuster the same month she graduated, and Roy was in the middle of acquiring his second undergraduate degree at the FAMU-FSU College of Engineering. Realizing that Roy’s professional choices would necessitate leaving Tallahassee eventually, the two decided to follow Brown’s career to Dallas and Roy transferred his studies to the University of Texas at Arlington.

The theme of successfully negotiating the demands of school and work with their personal lives has always been a part of the Browns’ union, so their balancing act naturally carries over into raising children.

“If you sit down and you start thinking about everything, you can get overwhelmed very easily, so we find a balance,” said the mother of three. Having hired a nanny after their third son was born, one of them

is home every morning until 8:00 a.m., when the nanny arrives. The one that leaves the house before the nanny arrives is always home by 5:30 p.m. Such a schedule requires teamwork, planning and mutual cooperation.

“We also try not to plan anything extra-curricular for the kids on weeknights and we do most of our extracurricular activities with the kids on the weekends, so that tends to help our stress levels,” said Brown.

Even though the majority of Brown’s spare time is devoted to her children, she still manages to steal a few hours a week for herself. Rising early for a 5:15 a.m. exercise class every Monday, Wednesday and Friday helps her get the day going and is something she really enjoys, even if she does not like

waking up before daylight. She also tries to reconnect with old classmates and sorority sisters whenever possible, sometimes at Florida State football games.

Navigating the demands of her rewarding career and young family has not kept Brown from setting significant goals. “I would like to be general counsel of a company one day,” she said. “But, along those lines, my family is very important to me and being able to do things with my children is very important to me. Striking that balance and being able to do that is probably not going to be the easiest thing to do. But I think I would like to try it. I have a very supportive family and a supportive husband so I think it’s a possibility.”

Brown admits her secret is simply taking life one day at a time. With her focus divided evenly between family and career, she is boldly parlaying the challenges of motherhood and professional success into a fulfilling future, both at home and at the office. For this Florida State Law graduate, the possibilities are limitless. ■

SERENDIPITY



Luck is the intersection of preparation and opportunity. That is one of the many pieces of sage advice Judge Emerson R. Thompson, Jr.’s grandfather shared with him when he was a young boy. While people might call Thompson lucky, the truth is that his dedication to preparation has been instrumental in his success as a husband, father and judge.

If you want a glimpse into the man Thompson is today, ask him to describe his grandfather – the man he credits as being “probably the most important male figure” in his life.

Calm, quiet and insightful, Herbert

Gay Jackson was “a very stabilizing force,” recalled Thompson, “and he was always available to give me counsel and guidance.”

When talking with the judge, you realize that the characteristics he admired in his grandfather – things like wisdom, a strong work ethic and self-reliance – were passed on to him and are the traits that have shaped his long and successful judicial career.

Growing up in the housing projects of Jacksonville, Florida, Thompson never contemplated a law career and did not envision himself on the bench as one of Florida’s future judges. His goal instead,

was to become a physician, and he was on track to becoming a doctor until his college organic chemistry course provided him with a change of heart, he joked. Even then, he still was not eyeing a legal career.

Having high verbal scores and an interest in history and politics, majoring in political science was a natural fit for Thompson. It was the late 1960s and the civil rights movement was going strong. He wanted to receive a degree in political science and a certificate in African Studies, which was taught in the political science department at the University of Florida, and his new aspiration was to earn his Ph.D. and become a professor so he could teach African Studies.

But just as Herbert Gay Jackson had predicted, Thompson experienced a stroke of luck when preparation and opportunity intersected and set into motion one serendipitous event after another.

Thompson and his senior roommate had a lot in common during his junior year at the University of Florida. Harry Lamb ('72) had taken the LSAT and planned to attend the Florida State University College of Law. The two roommates talked openly about Lamb’s reasons for pursuing law school and then, during the judge’s senior year, he learned that some of the professors he greatly admired earned very little when compared to many Florida attorneys.

It did not take long for Thompson to start making plans to take the LSAT.

“The Lord laid a blessing on my heart to change majors,” Thompson often says about his decision to change course and attend law school.

Thompson was accepted by two in-state law schools—Florida State and the University of Florida. Having already spent three full years in Gainesville, he decided to attend law school in Tallahassee because it offered more opportunity for a social life. Before he began law school, serendipity intervened again, leading Thompson to his future wife.

Geraldine Fortenberry worked as a secretary for the Council on Legal Education Opportunity (CLEO) program at the University of Miami during the summer of 1970 when Emerson R. Thompson was attending the six-week CLEO prep program for stu-

dents entering law school. The two met in June and married in December 1970.

Elected to the Florida House of Representatives in 2006, Geraldine Thompson is credited by her husband as having the most direct influence on him. "She has always been very focused on doing things and accomplishing things," said Thompson. "She'll see something and make it come true, not just dream about it or talk about it. That is a quality I've always admired in her."

Representative Thompson has also been supportive from the outset of her husband's career. During finals week of his last semester in law school, Thompson was offered a job at the State Attorney's Office in Orlando, where he had previously interned. At the time, he thought the city would be a temporary home for him and Geraldine. As a commissioned 2nd Lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force, his plans were to work in Orlando while awaiting a military assignment into the JAG Corps. But at the conclusion of the Vietnam War he was rifted from the military due to a reduction in forces.

While waiting it out in Orlando, Thompson became active in the Orange County Bar Association and formed a friendship with its executive secretary, Pat Sambrook. It was Sambrook who encouraged Thompson to apply for a vacancy on the Orange County Court in 1976. In fact, the only reason he applied for the vacancy was to fulfill a promise to Sambrook. If not for Sambrook's persistence, he would have forgone applying for the county court vacancy in favor of private practice, the judge recalled.

Today, Thompson still lives by the values that his grandfather passed on to him as a child. He remembers that his grandfather never tired of stressing a strong work ethic and self-reliance.

"When I was getting ready to grow up, and that's the way he would say it," said Thompson, "he said 'now that you are getting ready to grow up, you understand that every tub must sit on its own bottom. If you are going to be a man you are going to have to pick your own way to live and support yourself. You can't expect other people to support you.'"

Thompson is clearly the man his grandfa-

ther worked to mold. After his appointment to the Orange County Court in 1976, he was appointed to the Ninth Judicial Circuit in 1980, and then to the Fifth District Court of Appeal in 1993. His commitment to Florida has earned him a 31-year-long judicial career.

During his time as a trial court judge, Thompson sat on a number of interesting, high-profile cases. One death penalty case involved the woman known as Florida's "Black Widow," who was convicted of killing her husband and her son and attempting to kill her boyfriend. Her execution in 1998 was the first for a woman in Florida since 1848.

When talking with the judge, you realize that the characteristics he admired in his grandfather – things like wisdom, a strong work ethic and self-reliance – were passed on to him and are the traits that have shaped his long and successful judicial career.

A rape trial involving Australian victims was another case over which Thompson presided. It wasn't until the judge was recognized in England by someone who followed the trial that he knew the case had international repercussions. "Cases have an impact on people that you don't even realize," commented Thompson about the power of television and the news media.

Even though his time on the bench has been very interesting and rewarding, it is not the accomplishment of which Thompson is most proud. The judge's voice lights up when he talks about his three children. He has two daughters: Laurise Ann Thomas, an entrepreneur in Tallahassee, and Elizabeth R. Thompson, a pharmaceutical sales rep for Pfizer in Pasco County. His son, Emerson R. Thompson, III, is an accountant in Tallahassee.

Every tub in the Thomson family sits on its own bottom, and the children reflect the judge's hard work and Geraldine's ability to make things happen. "My kids have done well," said Thompson. "They've never given me a nickel's worth of real trouble."

The Thompson family has had some good "luck," as everyone still benefits from

the wisdom of Thompson's grandfather. Now that he is older and has his own family, the youngest Emerson Thompson has an even greater appreciation for the nuggets of wisdom passed on by his father.

"Those sayings have a whole new meaning and have definitely played a role in my life," said Emerson Thompson, III. As his two daughters, ages two and six, get older and can grasp the words' value, he knows he will repeat them over and over again as his father did.

"My dad has been an inspiration and a good example of what a father should be," said Thompson, III. "And he is a good example professionally. He was one of the

first African-American judges in the state and dealt with a lot of adversity and opened a lot of doors. He always adhered to his principles and maintained his integrity and was professional."

As one might guess, Thompson's plans for the future involve working hard and being prepared if an opportunity arises. After being on the bench for over 31 years, he will retire in January 2008 when he completes his tenure in the Florida Deferred Retirement Options Plan. If the past is any indication of the future, opportunity will come knocking again and Thompson will be ready. Herbert Gay Jackson would be proud. ■

Keeping up with Atlanta’s hottest trends is a full-time job. The invitation Weitzman reluctantly accepted placed her next to founder and then co-owner of *JEZEBEL* magazine Josh Goodhart, who quickly struck up a conversation with her over dinner about his search for an editor. She had been litigating at the Atlanta law firm Long, Weinberg, Ansley and Wheeler (now Weinberg, Wheeler, Hudgins, Gunn &

Dial) for three years and while really enjoying the lawyers of the firm and her clients, the itch to jump into the business world was overwhelming. Within days, the 1996 College of Law honors graduate met with *JEZEBEL*’s other owners and was hired.

With its exclusive celebrity interviews, exotic travel features, previews of the newest restaurants and timely columns about Atlanta trends, *JEZEBEL* is the lifestyle magazine that you find in the board rooms of the city’s leading professionals and at the homes of Atlanta’s most affluent residents.

As the executive responsible for the overall vision for the look and feel of this monthly publication, Weitzman’s days involve conceptualizing articles, managing and hiring writers, editors and photographers, fielding hundreds of e-mails from local and national businesses wanting *JEZEBEL*’s attention, and orchestrating exclusive celebrity cover stories—and that is just her morning schedule. She also works with the art department to ensure that the vision for an article is accurately presented on the magazine’s pages and aligns the activities of the events division with the overall branding strategies for the magazine.

Researching the high-end resort destinations that are splashed across the pages of each issue of *JEZEBEL* has given Weitzman the opportunity to travel extensively and enjoy the perks that come with the position Weitzman has held for almost eight years. She recently traveled to Mustique, a private island that serves as a playground for rock legend Mick Jagger and fashion designer Tommy Hilfiger, and is closing in on accomplishing her goal of experiencing all the Caribbean islands. “Before I started at the magazine, I didn’t even own a passport,” remarked Weitzman. “And now I’m almost done with my passport – I need to get another one.”

In addition to accumulating a bank of frequent-flyer miles, Weitzman dines at the finest gourmet restaurants, has access to luxury cars, and the list of celebrities she has met and interviewed is as long as it is impressive. It includes music legend Elton John, film icon Pierce Brosnan, pop music queen Mariah Carey, “Grey’s Anatomy” leading man Patrick Dempsey, “24” star

Kiefer Sutherland and the sensational Mandy Moore, who graced the cover of *JEZEBEL's* June 2007 issue.

"You forget about their celeb status when you are talking to them," said Weitzman about her encounters with celebrities, "because what you realize is, they are just like everyone else. They just happen to act for a living."

As you might expect, the line between Weitzman's professional and personal lives is blurred, but she would not change a thing. "I love what I do. When I was transitioning from law, I wanted to find something that when I woke up every day I was super excited about," she said. "I wanted something where there wasn't a definitive line between work and life, and that's what I get to do now. Work is life, and life is work. And I wouldn't change a thing. I am fortunate to have amazing owners, and I am so thankful for the opportunities they have afforded me."

She admits that for better or for worse, she is definitely a workaholic, but "it's not necessarily a bad thing when you love what you do, to always want to do it."

But like most other facets of Weitzman's personal life, her pets are a part of her work. "They actually have their own column in the magazine where they model doggie couture

fashions," explained the owner of two King Charles spaniels.

Even though the career track Weitzman took to becoming an influential businesswoman is very different from the route taken by other College of Law alumni, she says her legal education at Florida State and the years she spent practicing law absolutely help her excel in the fast-paced magazine world.

"The legal education and then having practiced law has definitely served me well," said the hard-working editor who passed the Georgia Bar during her third year of law school. "I have utilized the communication skills that I learned, and being able to manage my time efficiently (which she attributes to the years she spent billing hours) is key. I am very appreciative for the time that I spent practicing, and I certainly see it as an asset. It helps me look at articles in a much different way than a typical editor would because I understand the legalities of things, and certainly have a critical eye. Also, I really appreciate what I have now."

For someone who earns a living from the written word, it is surprising that as a first-year law student, Weitzman was terrified of her Legal Writing I course. She credits her professor, Claire Matturro, with helping her get over the fear by spending extra time working with her to build her confidence in that arena.

"Ironically, about a year ago I got an e-mail from Claire Matturro, saying 'Hello Beth. I'm wondering if this is the same Beth Weitzman who took my legal writing class who is now editor-in-chief of two of

Atlanta's finest magazines. Is this you? That is wonderful. Congratulations,'" recalled Weitzman. "It was kind of funny how it all came around."

Thanks in part to Matturro's advice and mentoring, Weitzman excels by writing about things she finds fun and entertaining. Her advice for other lawyers considering nontraditional jobs is to "figure out what you are really good at, what you love to do, and figure out what the job is from there.

If you believe in yourself and your abilities, you can make it happen."

Clearly, Weitzman's passion for her job will continue to help her promote affluent living in Atlanta for many years to come. With the upcoming launch of *Tuxedo Road*, the first magazine that Weitzman and her team have created from scratch, this is an exciting time to be working at Dickey Publishing. "For me, the challenge is obviously that it is a magazine for men and I am not a man," said Weitzman. "The nice thing is having owners that are very involved and excited about the project. I get to pick their brains and really put together the ultimate magazine, targeting a very specific high-end demographic of Atlanta men."

While preparing for the launch of *Tuxedo Road* and performing her many other daily duties is keeping Weitzman busy, she has big goals for the future. Continuing to build the *JEZEBEL*, *Atlanta Sports and Fitness* and *Tuxedo Road* magazine brands in Atlanta is her first order of business, but eventually Dickey Publishing plans to enter other markets, and she is very excited about doing just that.

Whatever the future holds for this Florida State College of Law graduate, one thing is certain. Few lawyers ever get the assignment to travel the world, as Weitzman does, and even fewer get the opportunity to walk shoulder-to-shoulder with the glamorous. ■

Daniel M. Soloway: CIVIL RIGHTS, PERSONAL INJURY AND FAMILY



Dan Soloway remembers the first piece of advice he received upon entering the Florida State University College of Law in 1982. “I asked my torts professor for her best advice on how to achieve success in law school. She sized me up, stared at my long hair and replied, ‘Get a haircut.’”

So began a law school experience that has led to a 23-year legal career highlighted by awards and achievements reserved for those lawyers with exceptional competence, the highest ideals of professionalism and dedication to the legal field. From The Florida Bar President’s Pro Bono Service Award in 1990, to presenting a “friend of the court” argument before the United States Supreme Court in 2004 as the attorney chosen from over 50,000 members of the Association of Trial Lawyers of America to represent them before the Supreme Court, to his “AV” Martindale Hubbell rating and his State and National board certifications in civil trial law, Soloway credits many of his achievements to the advice he received from his professors while attending law school at FSU.

“I got the haircut first, and then I kept on listening to my professors during the next three years. In a nutshell, they advised me to work harder than all the other lawyers and to have a career that included more than just practicing law.”

Soloway took full advantage of his time in law school. With help from professors Steve Goldstein and Chuck Ehrhardt, he began trying cases as the appointed FSU Public Defender and as a summer intern with the State Attorney’s Office for the Twentieth Judicial Circuit. By the time he graduated law school with honors in 1985, Soloway had voluntarily worked for all the circuit judges in Tallahassee and clerked for the Dexter Douglass law firm. Upon graduation, he received numerous employment offers from trial law firms throughout Florida, having tried more than forty cases – including eleven jury trials – during law school.

“I accepted the job offer in Pensacola, even though it was the lowest paying position of all the offers, because it presented the greatest potential,” said Soloway. “I wanted to do constitutional law cases, including

civil rights trials and appeals. My employer gave me that discretion immediately upon passing the bar. Constitutional law was my favorite subject, although it was not the course in which I got my highest grades. Nevertheless, it was in my mind, the most important area of the law.”

During the more than two decades he has devoted to trying cases, Soloway has won numerous million and multi-million dollar jury verdicts and settlements in both civil rights and personal injury cases. Noteworthy cases include a two-week trial in Montgomery, Alabama, where Soloway convinced a federal jury to award \$2.3 million to two Florida men whose civil rights were violated when an Alabama police captain planted drugs on them to attain a criminal conviction.

In another case, Soloway won the largest settlement ever paid in a civil rights case from the Federal Bureau of Prisons, stemming from an inmate death in Atlanta, Georgia. Soloway set more records in winning a \$10 million jury verdict in a simple trip-and-fall case, one of the largest such verdicts in Florida and the nation.

The case Soloway says was one of his most rewarding also set a record jury verdict, but that is not why he treasures that victory above others. “My first federal jury trial was very rewarding because it showed me that I could really ‘do it.’ I tried the case and beat the most experienced and successful civil rights defense lawyer in the Southeast. I remember thinking, ‘I really can be good at this.’ I don’t know that it was my best effort or verdict though, because I was still a rookie, only two years out of law school.”

The civil rights case, *Mandel vs. Doe*, was only his second case after graduation from law school. Representing an injured prison inmate who was refused adequate medical care concluded in a judgment on a jury verdict of almost \$1 million, the largest such verdict in Escambia County history. The appeal of the case before the Eleventh Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals created precedent for millions of citizens in four states, and has been cited more than 1,000 times by federal appellate courts across the country.

Soloway credits his record jury verdicts to hard work and his passion for jury trials.

Yet he distinguishes his trial work from other pursuits within his legal career.

“I love to write, and I really hope to carve out the time necessary to create and publish both legal and non-legal works I can be proud of and that other people will enjoy,” Soloway said. He has already written more than a dozen published articles and, as a 21-year-old undergraduate student at the University of New York, he wrote a book on civil justice reform. His current project is a bit more ambitious since it is his first attempt at writing a screenplay.

Soloway met his current project’s subject, Alabama attorney Fred Gray, during a federal civil rights case in which Gray served as Soloway’s local counsel. At the time, Soloway had never heard of Fred Gray, nor did he even recognize the name. As the civil rights attorney for Rosa Parks, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., the Montgomery Bus Boycott, the Tuskegee Syphilis Study and hundreds of other major cases that energized the civil rights movement in America, Gray’s achievements are legendary, even if his name is not well known. Following the trial, Gray asked Soloway to write the screenplay for a Hollywood movie based upon his best-selling autobiography, “Bus-ride to Justice.” The project that is Soloway’s labor of love is almost complete.

“I also love to teach and mentor young lawyers,” said Soloway. “What I love is filling in the gaps. I love being able to give young lawyers the benefit of my experience by providing the details of practicing in various areas of law. It keeps them from falling into traps as a result of being unwary of the pitfalls of complex lawsuits and trials.”

Over the last sixteen years, Soloway has given lectures and speeches throughout Florida and the nation to hundreds of lawyers on subjects including personal injury, civil rights, disability law and trial advocacy. He also regularly teaches and mentors the associates at his law firm.

Beginning in January 2008, Florida State law students will benefit from Soloway’s years of experience and knowledge when he and Gray teach a civil rights litigation course as adjunct professors at the law school.

Since he graduated, Soloway has remained involved in the law school and

teaching is just one more way that he will strengthen his connection to Florida State. “One of the things that makes me most proud of FSU is Don Weidner,” said Soloway of the man he initially knew as a property professor. “As he’s risen to the rank of dean, I don’t think I’ve ever seen anyone work so hard to make our law school so great and it makes me very proud.” It was Dean Weidner who convinced Soloway to establish the Soloway Diversity Enhancement Scholarship Fund, which provides thousands of dollars to minority first-year students who would otherwise be unable to afford to attend Florida State Law.

With so many diverse achievements, Soloway says the accomplishment he is most proud of is doing what he said he always wanted to do. “I always wanted to be a lawyer, and I always wanted to be a family man. I was lucky; I decided at an early age what I wanted to be and how I wanted to get there, and I did it.”

Soloway’s wife Natalie (a 1987 Florida State graduate with a B.S. in psychology) and daughters Rachael Ann and Rebecca Leigh always come first. “I’m for the most part a family man. I like to spend time with my children and my wife,” he said when asked what he does in his spare time. Cooking family dinners and taking the girls to school are daily activities for the 1985 College of Law graduate and sole owner of the Soloway Law Firm in Pensacola.

In its ninth year of fighting for the rights of clients, the firm’s four attorneys and ten employees litigate cases throughout the Southeast. Over the last twenty years, Soloway’s civil rights cases have received national and even international attention, including coverage by all the major television and cable news networks, as well as *The New York Times* and other prominent print media.

“I’m leaving the public exposure and heavy litigation of the big civil rights cases to the younger lawyers at my firm,” Soloway said. With all his other projects, Soloway has plenty to do besides practicing law, evidence that he is still following the advice given to him by his law school professors more than two decades ago. ■

Law Student Returns to Africa Through an Internship

My destiny, my history, and my future are entrapped in the beautiful continent raped of its beauty and prosperity, Africa. I am the living testament that hard work and determination may be enslaved or trapped, yet never will they disappear. My parents are both refugees from the Eritrean war against Ethiopia. Like many other Eritreans, they walked to Sudan with nothing but a dream and the clothes on their backs for a better life.

My internship with the National Union of Eritrean Women (NUEW) in Eritrea this past summer was a life changing experience, to say the least. It was only the second time I had visited the country and started with a five day tour of Gash Barka in the Northeastern tip of Eritrea, where the country's nine tribes are hungry for changes yet satisfied with simplicity.

The tour culminated in the grand opening of a new NUEW training center in Barentu, where the women and young girls in the village can learn how to read, write, sew, and generate income. The grand opening of the training center showed the unity of the international Eritrean community. These women showed me that as a group, anything is possible. They saved a million nakfa (the Eritrean currency) to build this training center. I was so proud to intern with such a great organization.

When the tour concluded, I began the normal office hours of the internship. I

worked with the research department from 8-6 p.m. doing various activities, traveled to several villages researching the situation of women in the country and created a presentation comparing the laws that affect women in Eritrea and the United States.

I also helped with the organization's Web site and taught basic computer skills to a group of about 13 young girls with another intern. When the class began, some of students did not know how to capitalize a letter, space between words, or even indent a paragraph. Within four to five weeks they were typing papers, creating PowerPoint presentations, and performing various Excel functions. That was one of the most fulfilling experiences I got out of the internship. Helping the underrepresented areas of the population is where my heart lays, whether it is in America or Africa.

My internship enhanced my skills as a future attorney. For example, one day I sat through a client arbitration/mediation session in which a NUEW counselor was talking to a young woman who said she was raped by an older man while working as his house maid. The mediator explained to the woman all of her rights and options. I noticed that the arbitration process in Eritrea is very similar to process in the United States.

I also visited court rooms in Eritrea and sat through informative civil law proceedings. I observed that Eritrea court rooms

are less formal than those in the United States and judges seemed to be more like friends. Asking judges questions about the Eritrean legal system taught me even more. One judge articulated the main distinctions between American and Eritrean laws, with the main difference being that Eritrea has not adopted the jury system in the courtroom. However, disputes in the more rural parts of Eritrea are settled by a group of elders, similar to a jury.

My assignments in Eritrean villages motivated me to be a fighter. During one project, I interviewed and researched the financial situations of multiple women to whom the organization had loaned money. One woman was loaned the equivalent of \$66, which she used to buy a battery-operated television. Charging people a few cents to watch the television, she eventually saved enough money to open her own store. The widow and mother of five showed me that devastation is God's way of providing us with an opportunity to persevere.

My trip to Eritrea this summer was a humbling experience. From electricity outages to not having hot water to hand washing my clothes, I had to adjust to a simpler life. After being in Eritrea for a while I was not begging for civilization, yet dreaming that everyone in civilization would experience the beauty of traveling and learning from people like my family. Fortunately, I got to meet my great-grandmother for the second time. She may live in a village, and she may not be the richest woman in the world, but a bubble of happiness and joy surrounds her. By the end of my time in Eritrea I had learned to value life more.

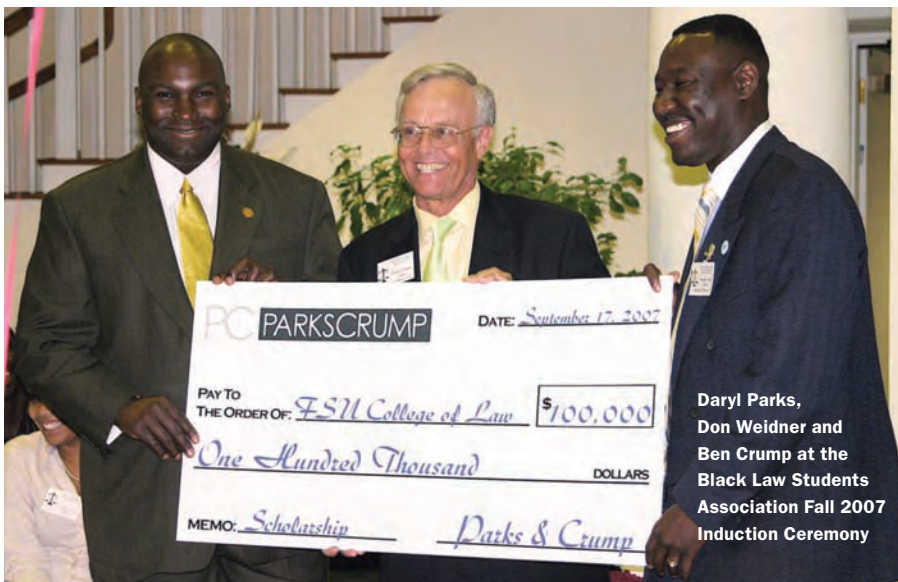

College of Law Graduate Mentors the Afghan National Army

One of the least discussed elements of the conflict in Afghanistan is the mentoring program currently underway with the Afghan National Army (ANA) and Afghan National Police (ANP). As a United States Navy Judge Advocate General (JAG) Corps officer who recently returned from an assignment in Afghanistan, I witnessed firsthand the country's struggle to implement a new legal system and tried to contribute to Afghanistan's efforts to overcome years of poverty and conflict. Mentoring was at once inspiring, humbling, infuriating and frustrating; and, above all, it was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to help rebuild a nation.

The state of Afghanistan is in the process of rising from the ashes of 30 years of war. Life and death issues such as rampant unemployment, solving critical infrastructure problems, raising literacy levels, and lowering infant mortality are critical to Afghanistan's development. Couple these issues with an active insurgency and you have a snapshot of the problem faced by Afghanistan's people and the fledgling democratic government charged with leading the nation into a brighter future. What I found remarkable is that Afghanistan is simultaneously exploring a much more philosophical issue: how to develop the rule of law, believing that this too is a key to its

lasting security.

During my tour in Afghanistan I spent most of each day with Afghans, teaching, listening, debating, drinking chai and talking about our families, politics and how to solve the world's problems. I was the first non-relative female that my Afghan counterparts had ever met. In Afghanistan, men do not interact with women outside of their own family as social events are strictly divided by gender. My Afghan counterparts quickly and openly accepted me, treating me with respect and as an equal. My gender was no more than an initial novelty and, for one official, a recruiting tool. At one of our meetings, he announced that he told Afghans he met on ANA recruiting trips, "There are American women here fighting for your country, yet you still do nothing! You should be ashamed of yourself!"

My official job as a mentor was to help the ANA's Judge Advocate General—a non-lawyer, Soviet trained artillery man—and the members of the ANA JAG Corps to learn how to use the newly-adopted military justice system. This system is fairly similar to our Uniform Code of Military Justice and is a significant departure from previous military justice systems in Afghanistan. I advised prosecutors and defense counsels, most of whom had no formal legal education, on how to present evidence, make

arguments and advocate for their clients. I advised trial and appellate level judges on motions practice—a new and novel concept that still exists more in theory than in practice—and how to deal with violations of criminal procedure and the conflicts between what they believe is "right" and what the law tells them is legal. I helped the corps, as a whole, address policy issues including ethics regulations and unique problems such as how to handle political appointees who are illiterate but cannot be fired due to their connections.

My true challenge in being an effective mentor was trying to find the fine line between advocating new ideas and procedures and forcing elements of western jurisprudence on a culture in which they do not make sense. It was my job to introduce and explain western legal concepts, to fight the initial negative reaction against the newness of those ideas and to spark debate among Afghans about how to best push forward the rule of law in Afghanistan. However, it was decidedly not my job to create a clone of the American military justice system. I quickly learned that Afghans would ardently debate for a while and then abruptly concede the point to end the discussion, often with no intention of carrying out what was "agreed" upon. Letting the discussion reach that point was not only ineffective, but also disrespectful to Afghan culture.

As a mentor, my mission was to create a fair, transparent, and reasonably predictable system and to ensure that the resulting system worked within Afghan culture and society. The worst thing I could have done was to take the position that there was only one right way to achieve a just result.

ANNUAL FUND

We would like to thank those of you who made a major gift commitment between July 1, 2006 and June 30, 2007. These gifts make it possible to continue the dynamic advance of the academic programs and reputation of the law school.

\$1 million or more

A Florida State University College of Law graduate and his wife, who have asked to remain anonymous, have made a commitment to the law school of **\$1,000,001**, to be paid over four years, to create an **Endowment for Excellence**. The income distributed from this endowment can be used, at the discretion of the law school, for purposes that include student scholarships (merit- or need-based), merit incentives for faculty and funding for co-curricular or other student activities. This gift will be eligible for a 75 percent match from the State of Florida. The \$750,000 state match will also be put into the permanent endowment, creating a total endowment of \$1,750,001.

\$300,000 to \$999,999

Tallahassee residents **David** ('72) and **Debby Fonvielle** have made a **\$275,000** testamentary gift in addition to a **\$40,000** cash commitment to provide continued support of the **David and Debby Fonvielle Public Defender Service Award** they created in 2003. The award is given to Florida State College of Law graduates who are serving as public defenders in the Office of the Public Defender for the Second Judicial Circuit of Florida. Through the Public Defender Service Award, the Fonvielles hope to encourage more students to pursue a career in public service, recruit

students to the College of Law who are interested in pursuing a career in public interest law, specifically as a public defender, and reward those law school graduates who have completed at least one year of service with the Office of the Public Defender for the Second Judicial Circuit of Florida. David is a named partner in the Tallahassee firm of Fonvielle, Lewis, Foote & Messer.

\$100,000 to \$299,999

Atlanta couple **Kevin Wood** and **Mary Jo Peed**, both 1985 graduates of the law school, have committed **\$250,000** over time to create the **Kevin Wood and Mary Jo Peed Endowment for Excellence**. Kevin and Mary Jo chose to give the law school flexibility in the use of the income from this endowment. Income may be spent on things such as student scholarships, faculty incentives and co-curricular activities. This gift will be eligible for a 50 percent match from the State of Florida. Kevin Wood is Vice President, Counsel and National Business Development for Stewart Title Guaranty. Mary Jo Peed is Vice President, General Counsel for AT&T.

Tallahassee residents **Lawrence J. Block, Jr.** ('83) and his wife **Carol** have agreed to donate **\$150,000** over time to endow the **Lance and Carol Block Children's Advocacy Center Clinical Professorship**. This gift is historic because it is the first professorship specifically endowed to attract or to retain a clinical professor. When the

endowment is fully funded, it will be eligible for a 50 percent match from the State of Florida. Lance is a shareholder in the Tallahassee office of Searcy Denney Scarola Barnhart & Shipley, P.A., and he practices personal injury law.

Thomas K. Equels ('80) and his wife **Laura Fabar** have pledged **\$100,000** over time to establish the **Equels-Fabar Endowment for Social Justice** to teach law students about the importance of social justice. The income from the Equels-Fabar Endowment for Social Justice will fund programs and scholarships aimed at developing individual virtues to improve society. This gift will be eligible for a 50 percent match from the State of Florida. Kelly and Hal chose to give the law school flexibility in the use of the income from this endowment. Income may be spent on things such as student scholarships, faculty incentives and co-curricular activities. When the testamentary gift matures, it will be eligible for a 50

percent match from the State of Florida. Kelly is a partner in the Tallahassee office of Broad and Cassel. In 2004-2005, she served as president of The Florida Bar. Hal is general counsel for the Florida Police Benevolent Association.

Wisconsin residents **Robert J. Loots** and his wife **Mary Ladd Loots** (who is the daughter of Mason Ladd, the founding dean of the law school) have given **\$100,000** to endow the **Mason Ladd Merit Scholarship**. The income from the endowment shall be used to award a merit scholarship to one or more students who have demonstrated academic excellence in their law school studies. Financial need may also be taken into account as a consideration secondary to merit. When the endowment is fully funded, it will be eligible for a 50 percent match from the State of Florida. This is the second large gift that Bob and Mary have given to the law school. Their first gift of \$22,500 was in response to an effort to endow a professorship in Mason Ladd's name. Their most recent commitment recognizes Mason's legacy and celebrates the 40th anniversary of the founding of the law school.

Pensacola attorney **B. Richard Young** ('84) and his wife **Suzanne** have pledged **\$100,000** over time to create the **Young Family Endowment**. The income from the endowment shall be used: 1) to award a merit scholarship to one or more incoming law students who



have demonstrated academic excellence; and 2) to make a financial award to the student who finishes in the top of his/her law school class after the first year. This gift will be eligible for a 50 percent match from the State of Florida.

The **Allen, Norton & Blue** law firm, at the recommendation of **Susan Potter Norton** (1975 graduate and law school Board of Visitors member), has pledged **\$50,000** over time to endow the **Allen, Norton & Blue Book Award in Labor and Employment Law**. The **Cuban-American Bar Association** made a gift of **\$50,000** to endow the **Justice Raoul G. Cantero, III, Diversity Enhancement Scholarship**. The annual distribution from the endowment shall be used to award a scholarship to a Cuban American law student who has distinguished himself/herself academically and/or in service-oriented activities, or to any law school student who has distinguished himself/herself in research, writing, community service, and/or other activities of importance to the Cuban American community.

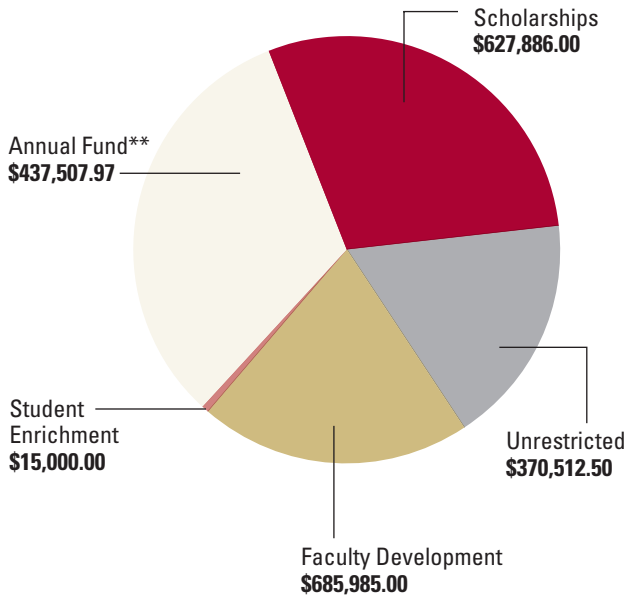

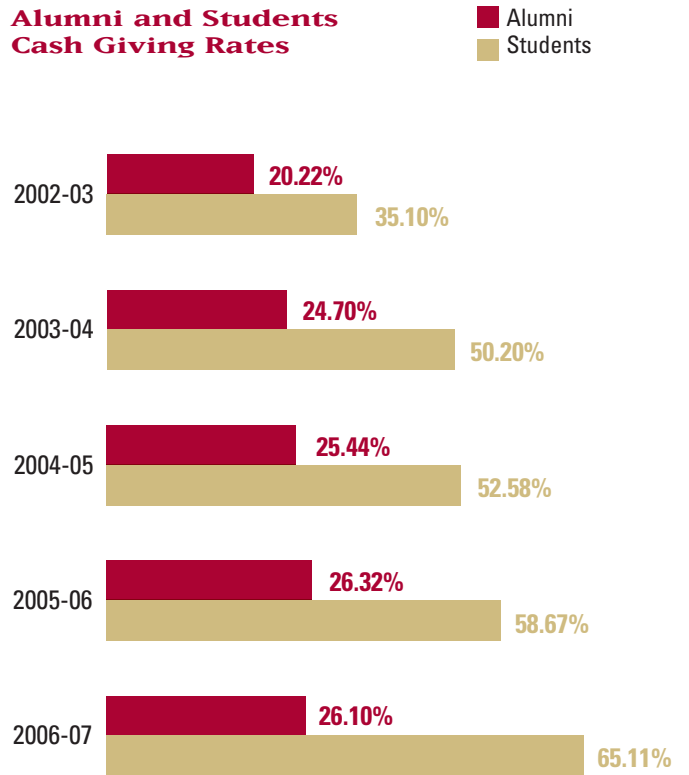

Total Cash Received \$2,136,891.47***

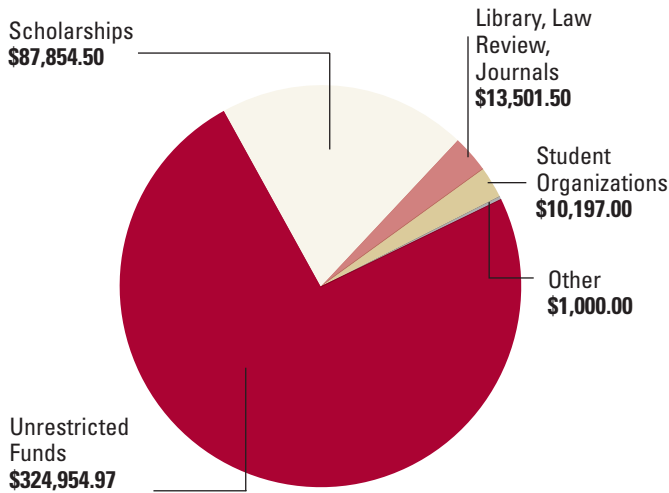

Cash Giving Rates**

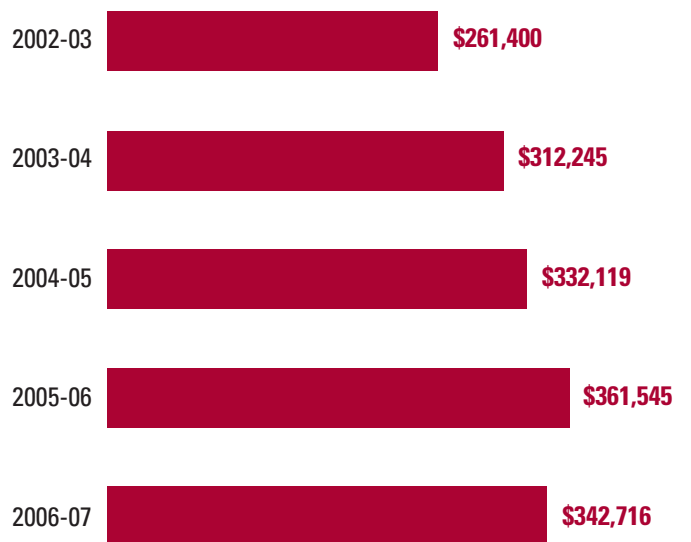


**2006-2007

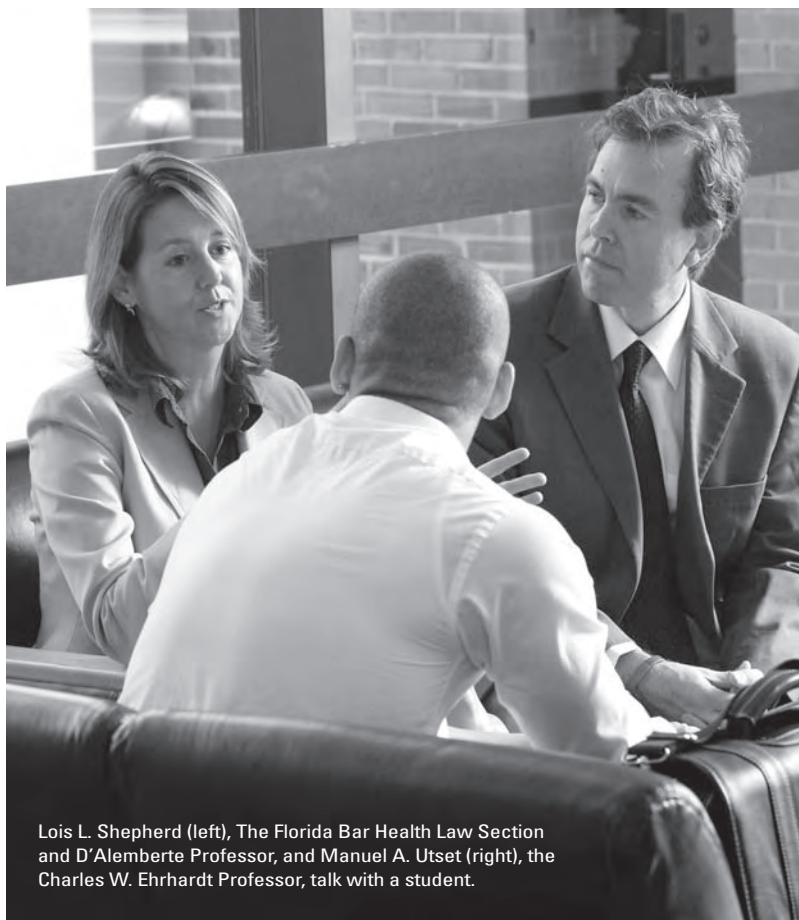

Our faculty members have distinguished themselves both nationally and internationally as leaders in their fields. Their scholarship is both visible and influential. This year, faculty members are also spreading our reputation by serving as Visiting Professors at Columbia, Harvard, The University of Pennsylvania and Vanderbilt.

It is critical to retain these extraordinary faculty members at Florida State. Just as in the private sector, productivity bonuses help. Endowed professorships provide salary supplements based on merit. They are not sinecures. Faculty members are appointed to endowed professorships for five-year terms, with

renewal contingent on continued scholarly productivity.

The minimum gift needed to endow a professorship in the College of Law is now \$200,000. Gifts to endow professorships are almost invariably made over time, usually over a five year period. The State of Florida matches gifts to endowment at incremental ratios, starting with 50 percent for gifts of at least \$100,000 and going up to 100 percent for gifts of \$2,000,001 and larger.

GIFTS TO ENDOWMENT

A gift to endowment is a deposit into a perpetual trust account. The law school gets to spend the income on the endowment (less portions automatically reinvested into corpus) according to the donor's wishes as expressed in a written Gift Agreement. The Gift Agreement will specify whether the income is **unrestricted**, to be used at the discretion of the law school, or **restricted** to a particular use specified by the donor.

A minimum gift of \$25,000 is required to establish an endowment account.

The amount may be paid over five-years.

ENDOWED CHAIRS AND PROFESSORSHIPS – provide the law school with the financial capacity to recruit and to retain highly productive faculty by assuring them that they will receive merit-based salary supplements.

CHAIRS – minimum \$1,000,001 contribution + \$750,000 minimum state match.

PROFESSORSHIPS – minimum \$200,000 contribution + \$100,000 minimum state match.

ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIPS – can make the difference in attracting the best and brightest students and in affording a legal education to students from families of modest means. Scholarships are awarded according to the intent of the donor, usually based on merit and/or need.

DEAN'S SCHOLARS – \$100,000 minimum contribution + \$50,000 minimum state match.

OTHER ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIPS – \$25,000 minimum contribution.

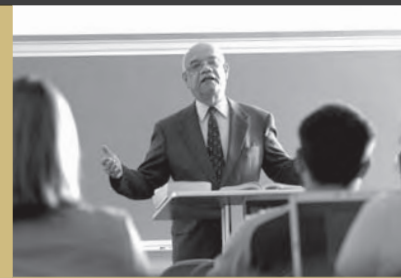

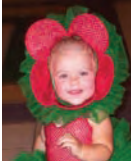

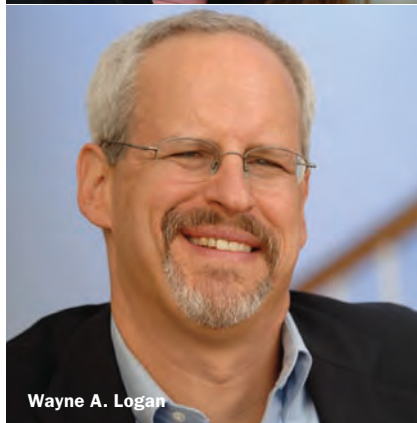

FACULTY IN THE *Blogosphere*

When he is not teaching class, collaborating with students or pursuing scholarship, Assistant Professor Dan Markel is most likely traveling through the blogosphere. The blog he started in 2005, PrawfsBlawg at Prawfs.com, is a forum that allows Professor Markel's ideas to be available to all without intermediaries or obstacles. As someone who was new to the legal teaching profession, the desire to create a community where young law professors could share important information and "banter" about scholarship motivated him to create the blog.

"Additionally, at the time I started Prawfs.com, there really wasn't a center-left alternative to the law professor group blog, the Volokh Conspiracy," said Professor Markel. "Our hope was that we would

emerge as a casual forum for independent and rigorous thinking – principally but not exclusively for moderates and liberals in the legal academy. Fortunately, we have achieved that goal. And, somewhat to my surprise and relief, the blog has self-consciously become quite hospitable to many points of view, including libertarian and conservative ones."

Another faculty member who can be found in the blogosphere is J.B. Ruhl, the Matthews & Hawkins Professor of Property. He is a founder of the Jurisdynamics blog and is an active blogger when time permits. Ruhl describes Jurisdynamics as "very eclectic. Its main focus is the dynamic interaction of law with science and policy and everything else."

Professors Markel and Ruhl are not the only faculty members active in the blogosphere. Previous contributors to Prawfs.com have included Florida State Law professors Brian Galle, Fernando Tesón and Lesley Wexler, and you can find posts



from several other law professors on other popular legal academia blogs.

"There are many different purposes for blogging and it's not for everyone," said Ruhl. "But it can be a really useful outlet."

Because of the many benefits of blogging – such as the ability to promote scholarship to audiences that would not have read works elsewhere, a sense of gratification, the ability to flesh out thoughts for future work and the freedom to discuss ideas at the depth and time of their choosing – it is no surprise that the Florida State Law faculty has made its presence known in the blogosphere.

Klick and Gelbach Conduct Workshop at Yale Law

In March 2007, Jonathan Klick, the Jeffrey A. Stoops Professor, and Jonah Gelbach, a Visiting Professor, presented their paper titled *Cheap Donuts and Expensive Broccoli: The Effect of Relative Prices on Obesity* at Yale Law School. Because information about the pair's work in the general topic of statistics known as bootstrapping—a way to better measure how confident scholars should be with respect to statistical estimates—would be useful in empirical legal studies, Klick and Gelbach were asked if they would conduct a day-long workshop on the topic for the Yale faculty.

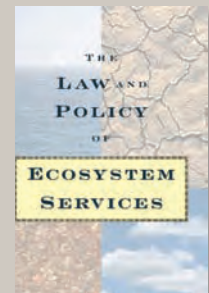
On July 19, Klick and Gelbach returned to Yale Law to teach some of the nation's top faculty members who conduct empirical legal studies. The pair presented *Using BS effectively in Empirical Law and Economics: A Primer on the Bootstrap Parts I & II*, walking Yale faculty through bootstrapping methods using existing papers and simulations. In one example, Klick and Gelbach showed how the results in one of Klick's published papers changed when the more sophisticated methods were used. "Everyone in attendance was very interested and asked a lot of questions," said Klick. "And they were exceedingly positive in their feedback."

Hispanic Business Magazine Again Names Florida State the Nation's Sixth Best Law School for Hispanics



Florida State is once again the nation's sixth best law school for Hispanics, according to *Hispanic Business* magazine. This is the fourth year in a row that the law school has been named in the top ten and the second year in a row that the law school has been ranked sixth best.

The magazine surveyed all the nation's law schools accredited by the American Bar Association and ranked them on a variety of factors, including the percentage of Hispanic students enrolled, the percentage of full-time Hispanic faculty, services for Hispanic students, Hispanic recruitment efforts and retention rates, and quality of education and reputational ranking as reflected in *U.S. News & World Report*.

For the 2006-2007 academic year, Hispanics made up eight percent of the school's 765-member student body enrollment and received 19 of the

245 law degrees awarded to the class of 2007. Seven percent of full-time faculty members were Hispanic.

"Because other schools have even more Hispanic students and faculty than we do," said Dean Don Weidner, "it is our reputation for academic excellence that puts us over the top."

This is the fourth year in a row that the law school has been named in the top ten and the second year in a row that the law school has been ranked sixth best.

Florida State Grads Have the Best Bar Passage Rate Again

Florida State Law graduates have again ranked first in the state on the July administration of the Florida Bar exam. For three of the last four administrations of the exam, Florida State graduates have been first in the state.

Florida State grads taking the July 2007 General Bar Examination for the first time passed by a rate of 89 percent, according to statistics released by the Florida Board of Bar Examiners. The overall passing rate of graduates taking the exam for the first time was 80.4 percent. The exam was administered July 24-25 in Tampa to 2,450 first-time takers, including 164 from Florida State.

“We are all thrilled with the record of excellence our students have achieved on the Florida Bar Exam,” said Dean Don Weidner. “Special congratulations and thanks go to the May 2007 graduates for their superb accomplishment.”

Stephanie Williams, a 1995 graduate of the law school, has been appointed the new Assistant Dean for Development at Florida State Law. She replaces Mark Pankey, who is now the Assistant Vice President for Development at the Florida State University Foundation. Williams practiced law in Tallahassee before joining the law school as Director of Career Placement in 1999. She was later promoted to Associate Dean for Administration in 2000. Both in her capacity as a practicing attorney and as a member of the law school’s administrative team, she has been extremely engaged with the legal profession and the law school’s alumni. Also serving as competition judges were attorneys from the Office of the Public Defender, the U.S. Attorney’s Office, the State Attorney’s Office and private firms.

Professor Lois Shepherd, a highly regarded bioethics and health law expert, has been appointed The Florida Bar Health Law Section Professor at Florida State Law. The Florida Bar Health Law Section endowed the professorship with a \$100,000 gift to the law school in 2001.

“We are delighted to have Professor Shepherd in place as The Florida Bar Health Law Section Professor,” said Health Law Section chair Laurie Levin, who is of counsel at the Orlando office of Baker Hostetler. “As a leading authority on health law issues, she will help us advance our mission of providing a forum for communication and education leading to the improvement and development of the field of health law.”

An active teacher and scholar on health law, Shepherd is currently working to assure greater cooperation between the law school and Florida State’s medical school. She has expressed great enthusiasm about the appointment, which will bring together the work of the Health Law Section and its members and the law school’s students and faculty.

“It’s a real honor to be named to this professorship and I am looking forward to strengthening the ties between our students and faculty and the practicing health law bar,” she said.

Shepherd, whose scholarly output is extensive, has been a law school faculty member since 1993. She recently published a co-authored casebook titled *Bioethics and the Law* and has published and presented numerous articles related to the law of end-of-life decision-making. An expert on the highly publicized end-of-life decision-making case involving Florida resident Terri Schiavo, she has written several articles and made many presentations regarding the Schiavo case. Her law degree is from Yale University.

Twenty-five percent of the students in our 2007 entering class have LSAT scores of 162 or higher and the average LSAT is 160. The average GPA is 3.5.

Our May 2006 graduating class had a **99 percent placement rate** nine months after graduation.

This year, members of our faculty are serving as visiting professors at **Columbia Law School, Harvard Law School, the University of Pennsylvania Law School and Vanderbilt Law School.**

Overall, *U.S. News & World Report* (2007) ranks us in the **top tier of American law schools** in terms of academic reputation (at 48).
