AI Day in the Capital will bring together leaders in government, law, technology, and academia to examine the rapidly evolving landscape of artificial intelligence and its implications for public institutions, civic infrastructure, and ethical governance.

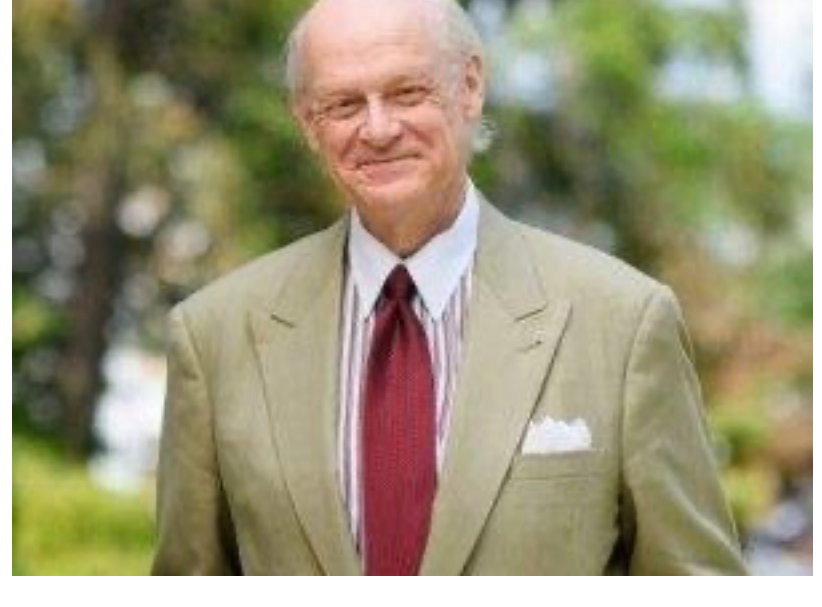


The event will explore how AI can be responsibly integrated into state systems, enhance public services, expand access to justice, and support informed policy development across Florida and beyond.

Alongside panel discussions and keynotes, AI Day in the Capital will feature hands-on demonstrations in the D'Alemberte Rotunda from departments across FSU's campus, showcasing their applications of AI in the classroom and in research, including healthcare, atmospheric research, and legal applications.

The College of Law will host a lecture by **Allen Guelzo**, widely regarded as the world's leading expert on **Abraham Lincoln**, at **3 p.m. on Thursday, January 22**, in Room 101. The event is presented in partnership with the **Institute for Governance & Civics** and is sponsored by the **Florida Supreme Court Historical Society**.

Guelzo, a professor at the University of Florida, will speak on **The Statesmanship of Abraham Lincoln: How Did the 16th President Hold Together a Nation—and How Can We Do It Again Today?** A moderated question-and-answer session will follow.

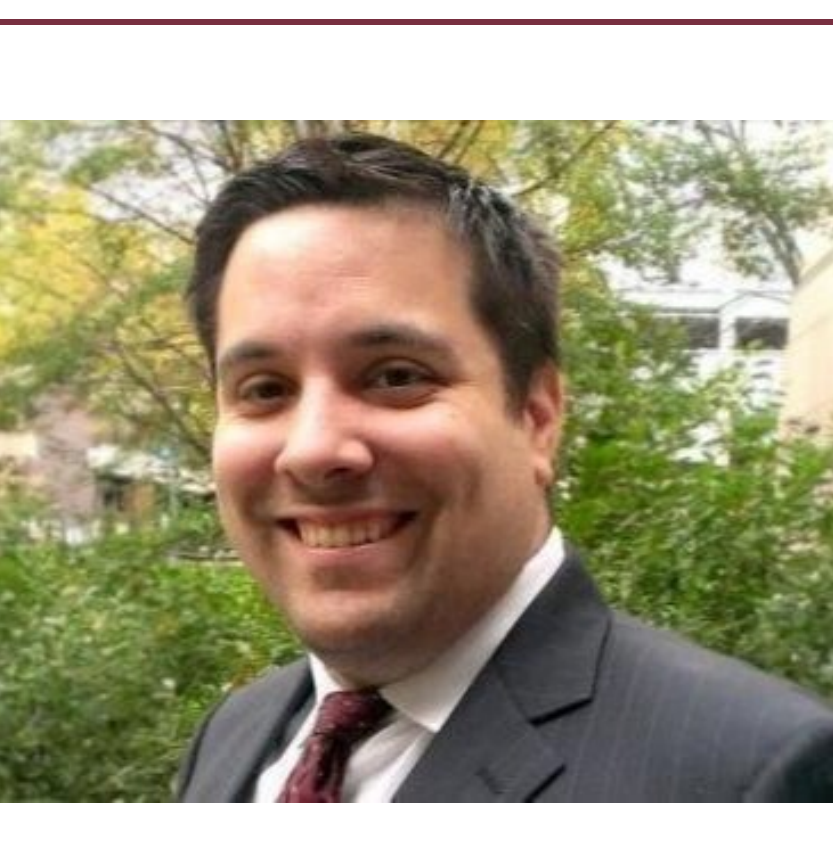
The lecture will examine Lincoln's leadership through the lens of statesmanship, focusing on his deep understanding of the rule of law and its role in sustaining democratic governance. Professor Guelzo will explore how Lincoln's commitment to law provided a vital balance between tyranny and anarchy and why those principles remain relevant in addressing today's civic and constitutional challenges.

Michael Morley, the Sheila M. McDevitt Professor of Law and Faculty Director of the Election Law Center at FSU, was recently featured in a **Washington Post** opinion highlighting his **amicus brief** in a U.S. Supreme Court case involving presidential authority and the Federal Trade Commission. The coverage underscores the **national attention** his scholarship is receiving on the future of executive power and the role of independent agencies.

"Had Congress known the Constitution bars it from protecting the heads of ostensibly independent agencies from at-will presidential removal, it would probably have written the Federal Trade Commission Act - and other laws - differently to prevent presidential abuse. For example, Congress might have 'narrowed the scope of the powers it conferred,' 'required the agency to follow additional procedures before exercising those powers' or 'expanded the scope of judicial review' of agency actions."

This experience deepened his interest in litigation strategy and the practical dynamics of resolving disputes on behalf of clients.

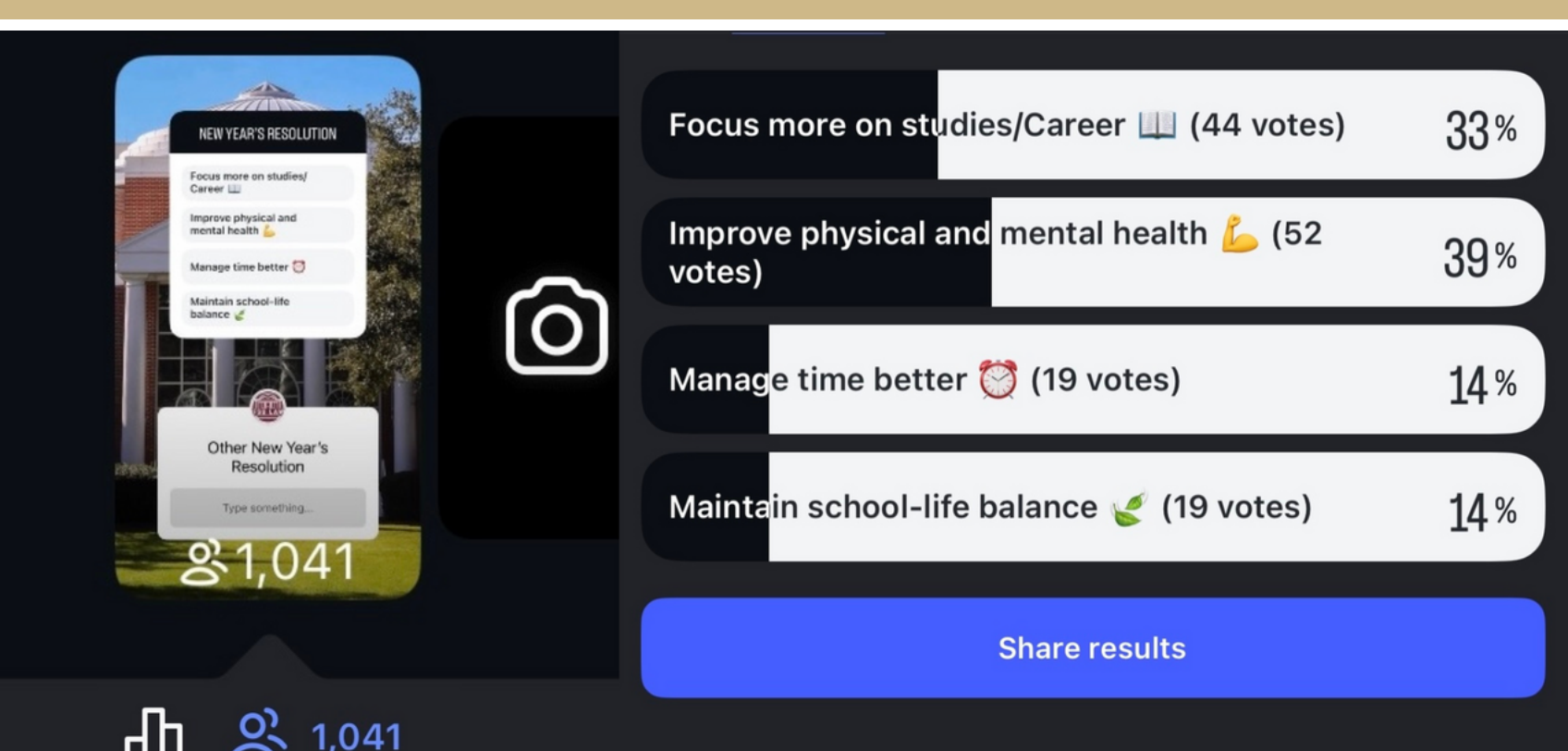
Since the fall of 2024, Couceyro has clerked at the **Florida Department of Financial Services**, where he honed his drafting skills, conducted substantial legal research, assisted in trial preparation, examined witnesses, and appeared before an Administrative Law Judge to advocate on behalf of the Department.

In addition to his legal training, Couceyro has remained actively engaged in the FSU Law community. He served as Treasurer of the Entertainment, Arts, and Sports Law Society during his second year and has participated in organizations such as the Jewish Law Student Association and the College of Law Ambassadors program.

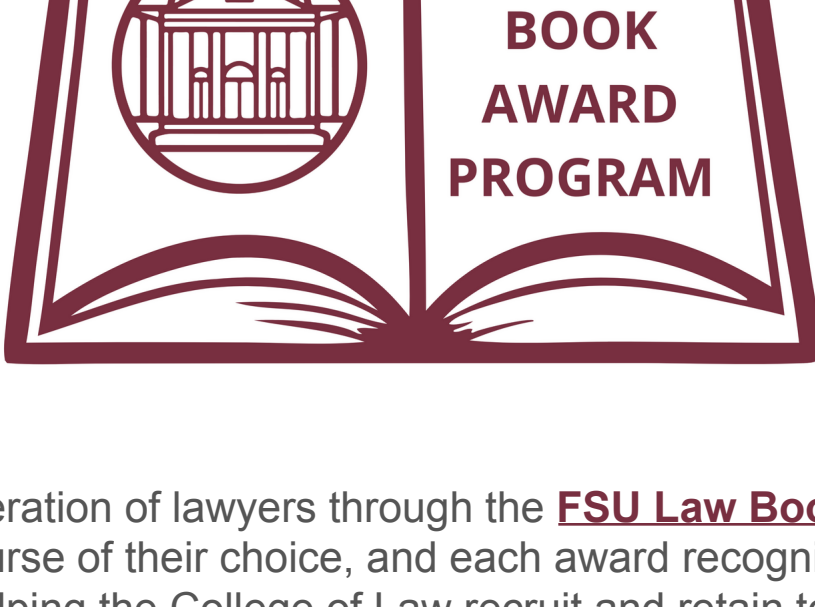
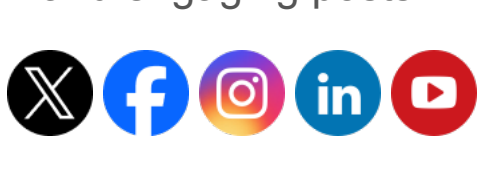


On New Year's Eve, we shared an interactive poll inviting students and followers to share their New Year's resolutions.

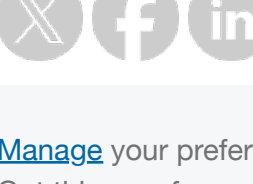
