D'Alemberte & Palmer Lecture in International Human Rights



We are pleased to announce that former **Ambassador Mark Brzezinski** will serve as the speaker for the fourth annual **D'Alemberte & Palmer Lecture in International Human Rights**.

Ambassador Brzezinski, who served as U.S. Ambassador to Sweden and Poland, will present **Ambassador Brzezinski to FSU Law**. His distinguished career at the intersection of diplomacy, law, and human rights offers our students and the broader community meaningful opportunities to engage with the complex, real-world challenges of advancing democratic values and protecting human rights globally.

Currently, Ambassador Brzezinski serves as president and CEO of Brzezinski Global Strategies, a geostrategic advisory firm. He previously served as a managing director at Makena Capital Management, where he led sustainability initiatives and advised on environmentally and socially responsible investment strategies.

The D'Alemberte & Palmer Lecture in International Human Rights is made possible through the generosity of Patsy Palmer, Esq., and was established to educate the community about the vital field of international human rights, inspire our students, and contribute to the broader global dialogue on human rights issues. Previous speakers in the series have included Former President of Ireland Mary Robinson (2025), Ambassador David Scheffer, the first U.S. Ambassador-at-Large for War Crimes Issues (2024), and former General Counsel of the U.S. Navy Alberto J. Mora (2023).

The event is free and open to the public and has been approved for 1.0 CLE general credit by the Florida Bar.

I hope you will join us for what promises to be a timely and important discussion.



FSU College of Law recently welcomed members of the Florida Supreme Court to the D'Alemberte Rotunda for coffee and conversation with students, focusing on career paths, public service, and the values that uphold the rule of law.

Hosted by the **Cuban American Bar Association (CABA)**, the event featured Chief Justice Carlos G. Muñiz along with Justices Jamie Grossman, Jorge Labarga, John Couriel, and Adam Tannenbaum.

During their discussion and student Q&A, the justices shared personal reflections on their professional journeys — many of which included nontraditional paths to the bench — and offered practical advice to students considering careers in public service and the judiciary. The conversation also addressed emerging challenges facing the legal profession, including technological change and maintaining public trust in legal institutions.

The event concluded with a guided tour of the Florida Supreme Court, providing students with a unique, firsthand look at Florida's highest court and an opportunity to further connect classroom learning with the realities of judicial service.


FSU College of Law recently hosted an evening with **Gregory S. Gordon**, Professor of Law at Peking University School of Transnational Law and former U.S. Department of Justice prosecutor, as he launched the North American tour for his new book, **Nuremberg's Citizen Prosecutor: Benjamin Ferencz and the Birth of International Justice**.

Professor Gordon, a former U.S. Department of Justice "Nazi hunter" and prosecutor in cases related to the Rwandan genocide, shared insights from his research on Benjamin Ferencz, the last surviving Nuremberg prosecutor and a pivotal figure in the development of modern international criminal law.

Co-sponsored by **HERC (the Holocaust Education Resource Council)** and the **Stoops Center for Law & Business**, the event highlighted previously lesser-known aspects of Ferencz's work at Nuremberg, including his role in the prosecution of Adolf Eichmann and his intellectual exchanges with political theorist Hannah Arendt.

The discussion offered attendees a powerful reflection on justice, accountability, and resilience, underscoring the enduring relevance of international legal institutions in confronting atrocities and defending human dignity.

Professor Michael Morley, the Sheila M. McDevitt Professor of Law and Faculty Director of the [Election Law Center](#), was featured in the History Channel's story, ["Why Do States Run Federal Elections?"](#)

In the article, Professor Morley explains that the Elections Clause of the U.S. Constitution grants states primary authority to determine the rules governing congressional elections. The U.S. Supreme Court has interpreted the clause as giving the states the authority to enact comprehensive election laws. Congress has the authority to step in and either replace rules that it doesn't like or create rules governing issues that the state has failed to regulate.


Professor Morley also appeared on WHYY's Studio 2 podcast in the episode ["President Trump's push to 'nationalize' elections."](#) He joined a panel of experts to discuss recent proposals and controversies around federal leadership over election processes, the constitutional role of states in administering elections, and implications for election integrity amid ongoing political debate.

In both appearances, Professor Morley provided measured legal analysis on how election law structures and constrains governmental action.
