

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### From the Dean



Recently, we welcomed the J.D. Class of 2028 to Florida State University College of Law. This remarkable group of 153 students brings the highest academic profile in our history, with a median LSAT of 166 and a median undergraduate GPA of 3.93!

Applications rose 16.7% over the previous cycle, and with only 15.9% of applicants admitted, this class reflects our increasing selectivity and reputation for excellence. This aligns as the College of Law continues to earn national attention, climbing to No. 38 overall and No. 17 among public law schools in the 2025 *U.S. News & World Report* rankings, and earning top honors from *The Princeton Review*—No. 4 in the nation for student quality of life and No. 6 for best professors.

The <u>Class of 2028</u> represents 67 undergraduate institutions, 27 states, and 12 countries. Collectively, these students speak 19 languages, have traveled or studied in 77 countries, and bring an extraordinary range of professional and personal experiences. From educators and veterans to artists, entrepreneurs, and scientists, their diverse perspectives will enrich our classrooms and our broader community.

## FSU Law Faculty News



Congratulations to <u>Professor Nadia</u>

<u>Banteka</u>, whose latest article, *Cross-Sovereign Policing and the Constitutional Crisis of Accountability*, is forthcoming in the <u>Yale Law Journal</u>.

Building on her broader project on police accountability, including articles *Police Vigilantism* (<u>Virginia Law Review</u>), *Police Brutality as Torture* (<u>UCLA Law Review</u>), and *Unconstitutional Police Pretexts*(<u>Wisconsin Law Review</u>), this piece examines how hybrid federal—state policing arrangements have reshaped American law enforcement and weakened the constitutional link between public power and accountability.

Professor Banteka shows where current doctrines—Section 1983, Bivens, and Supremacy Clause immunity—fall short in addressing cross-sovereign policing, creating gaps in remedies for misconduct. The article concludes with a reform framework—doctrinal, statutory, and institutional—to help restore democratic oversight and accountability.




