


indigent or underrepresented individuals, juvenile resentencings, criminal justice reform, prisoner's rights

and again this spring, she is doing pro bono work as a certified legal intern. Flores helped prepare a re-entry plan for an incarcerated client and drafted a motion for rehearing, subsequent to a resentencing she participated in the previous semester. At the rehearing in December 2019, Flores presented

the spring 2019 semester, Flores worked with post-conviction litigation focusing on juvenile resentencings under *Miller* and *Graham*, and legislative advocacy specifically working to eliminate juvenile solitary confinement. She also helped prepare an evidentiary juvenile resentencing for a juvenile offender initially sentenced to life without parole. During the 2019 Legislative Session, Flores spoke in front of the Senate Committee on Criminal Justice to educate about the harmful effects of juvenile solitary confinement. During the fall of her 2L year, Flores drafted an appeal and advocated on behalf of a Children's




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
