This year's virtual program will be similar to our in-person program and will include daily classes taught by law school professors, sessions on law school admissions and programming on careers in the law. Our 2021 schedule includes virtual visits to the Florida Supreme Court, moot court oral arguments and guest speakers, including prominent attorneys and judges from a variety of practice areas. 



Smith is the founder and two-term president of the FSU Law student organization Lawyers Uniting to Communicate Knowledge (LUCK), a professional development organization preparing students for the practice of the law via three major components—short-term shadowing sessions with legal professionals, attending conferences and hosting legal professionals at the school. He is also a member of the Aviation and Space Law Society, Phi Alpha Delta and the Student Bar Association. Smith is a licensed Florida notary, a certified legal intern and a certified PADI Open Water Diver. He is also a TEFL certified English language teacher and spent a year in China teaching English to children. 
